Follow in Harriet Tubman's footsteps as she escaped in 1849 and travel from Maryland's Eastern Shore through Delaware to reach her final destination in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Explore authentic escape missions and discover how hundreds of men and women risked everything to pursue their freedom.

Chesapeake landscapes – extensive waterways, marshes and woodlands – both helped and hindered freedom seekers.

HARRIET TUBMAN was a famous Underground Railroad conductor. Born Araminta Ross in Dorchester County, Maryland, she spent her early years in Bucktown on the farm of her owner, Edward Brodess.

After escaping, she made 13 trips back to the area and rescued at least 70 family members and friends THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD was a secret network of courageous people throughout the United

States who broke the law to offer transportation, refuge, food and comfort to escaping slaves during the 1700's and early 1800's. While it wasn't literally a railroad, it was named symbolically after the new steam trains and used terms such as "passengers," "depots," and "conductors.
